We have recently registered our year seven pupils on the Morrisby careers programme which will start to help them explore their options going forward. If you would like to see the possible career choices this has generated, then your child can login from home using the link below.

During Options week, year nine pupils were shown a GCSE 'options and careers' presentation and were invited to drop in to speak to the careers adviser over the lunch period if they needed any advice and guidance in making these choices.

Year 10 pupils were invited to a one-to-one interview to encourage them to start to think about possible careers they would like to explore in more depth and were urged to try and source some work experience for the summer. This will help to build on their confidence, improve their communication and time management skills and give them an understanding of the workplace.

Year 11 pupils were invited to a one to one interview to discuss their plans for either sixth form or college; as a result we are talking a small group of pupils to New City College at the end of April so they can experience a college environment and learn about the facilities and courses they offer.

Year 12 pupils were all invited to come and speak to me about their post 18 plans; ongoing support is available to year 12's and if your young person would like to come and see me, please ask them to email me or come into the office and I can make a time to see them.

After the Pesach holidays we will start to visit year eight and year nine classes.

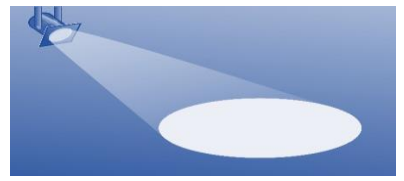

What did you do after leaving KS?

I went on to gain a First Class BA (Hons) in Philosophy from the University of Birmingham.

What do you do now?

I am a professional magician, performing at private and corporate events across the UK and further afield. I also supply other magicians for events, and I'm also a freelance consultant specialising in in-store product demonstration within the retail industry.

How did you choose this career path?

Magic has always been a hobby of mine, but I realised I could make money from it whilst at university. Upon graduating I spent 3 years managing a sales team of 50+ product experts who demonstrated and sold magic tricks in various central London locations. I used many of the skills from this job to eventually set up my own business and become my own boss.

What is the best thing about your job?

I have been fortunate enough to perform to audiences in the USA, Israel, India, China, Hong Kong, Dubai and across Europe.

What advice would you give to someone interested in pursuing a similar career?

For those interested in running their own business, or becoming a freelancer, I would encourage them where possible to gain some experience working with/ for others. Acquire for yourself some mentors within your desired industry whom you can rely on for advice and support.
