The first two weeks of the spring term have started at quite a pace with events, clubs, enrichment activities, school visits, parents evening, assemblies and a number of trips taking place.

On Thursday 9th January we welcomed Year 11 parents for the first in person parents evening since the Covid pandemic. It was a fantastic opportunity for parents to meet their child's teachers to discuss their current progress, recent mock exam results and map out what they need to do in order to achieve their potential in their GCSE exams this summer.

On Friday 10th January we were delighted to welcome the Rt Honourable Wes Streeting, MP for Ilford North and Secretary of State for health and social care. This week in synagogue we begin reading the second of the five books of Moses; Shemot (Exodus).

The first chapter starts with a new Pharoah on the throne 'who does not know Joseph' and is threatened by the Israelites, a minority group living amongst Egyptian society. Pharoah is concerned that they will overthrow him and challenge his power, so he enslaves them to prevent this. This story, although ancient brings, to the forefront issues that transcend time. Although multiculturalism is a common feature of a globalised world, there are many who feel threatened by it and today we see many politicians and political leaders who use a similar narrative to Pharoah. Pharoah was threatened by those that were different and rather than find a way to move forward as a cohesive but diverse community he discriminates against them by killing their sons and making them slaves. As we continue to read the story of the Exodus, we will see this proves to be his undoing. Therefore, as the story is timeless, so does the warning it offers; created a divisive society at your own peril.

Student behaviour and participation was excellent throughout the event and many thought-provoking questions were posed to Mr Streeting.

Royal Academy Young Artist's Summer Show 2025


Now in its seventh year, the Young Artists' Summer Show is a free, open submission exhibition for students aged 4-18 studying in the UK. Artworks are judged by a panel of artists and arts professionals, with selected artworks displayed online and on-site at the Royal Academy of Arts.

Each student can submit one artwork and there is no theme. The artwork can be made using any material; it can be a painting, sculpture, photograph, installation, video, drawing, or a combination. When you enter, you will be asked for an image of the artwork plus some information about the piece such as title, size, and some text which can include why you created the work and what it means to you. The panel of judges will see the artwork and the selected pieces will be shown in the Royal Academy's online exhibition. Some of the artworks will also be shown at the Royal Academy of Arts. Additionally, there are prizes awarded each year for inspiring artworks. You can also vote for your favourite artwork in the annual People's Choice Award.

The deadline for submissions is 5 March 2025.



Student medical needs

Should your child have an accident inside or outside of school that requires them to attend A&E, please inform the school as soon as possible as a Risk Assessment Meeting may need to be arranged. Any new medical conditions also need to be reported to Mrs Levy (Welfare/Safeguarding Officer).

Mental Health and Wellbeing

We are continuously working hard to improve our understanding as a community of mental health, to enable us to provide the best possible outcomes for the young people in our lives.
